What is Simpler Recycling?

New rules to improve consistency and increase recycling rates

Standardises what 'recycling materials' are

Food and glass waste must be separated

Dry mixed recycling must be separated

Simpler Recycling is a government policy designed to streamline recycling practices across England.

It introduces consistent rules for separating waste streams, aiming to address the confusion caused by varying local authority practices.



What bins will I need?

Four mandatory waste streams

General Waste Bin

For all non-recyclable waste

Dry Mixed Recycling Bin

For paper, cardboard, plastics and aluminium

Glass Recycling Bin

For all glass recycling

Food Waste Bin

For all food waste

There's **no minimum weight requirement** for any of these bins, so whether you're tossing out a single apple core or managing the leftovers of an all-you-can-eat buffet, you'll need all four bins.

For other types of waste, such as clinical waste, you'll need a dedicated bin to ensure proper disposal of these items.



Who does it apply to?

All businesses over 10 employees in England

The new Simpler Recycling legislation will apply to all businesses and households across England.





When is the deadline?

Key deadlines for businesses to comply with Simpler Recycling

31st March 2025

Businesses with 10 or more employees must separate food waste, glass waste, dry mixed recycling (paper, card, plastic, aluminium), and general waste.

31st March 2027

All businesses,
regardless of size, must
separate food waste,
glass waste, dry mixed
recycling (paper, card,
plastic, aluminium), and
general waste.



What happens if I don't comply?

Non-compliance can result in severe implications

Missed Collections

Penalties

Reputational Damage

Compliance Notices

Your supplier will refuse to collect your waste if it is not sorted into the correct bin, but you will still be charged for the collection.

Failure to adhere to compliance notices may result in legal penalties or enforcement actions under the Environment Agency's Enforcement and Sanctions Policy.

Businesses that fail to comply may face reputational harm, especially given the growing importance of sustainability to consumers. This can affect customer loyalty and brand image.
